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"For a non-profit Park, rents are very high. In all fairness, I request no rent increase!"

That's from a letter a Palomar West resident sent me, but I thought some of you might feel the same way. If only we could honor that request.

As was explained in the Rent Notice, the inflation rate on that date was 6.5% (it's well above 7% today). If Palomar's rents were to keep pace with inflation, they would increase by almost \$40.

That didn't happen, however. Although Palomar's expenses keep going up and construction costs are through the roof, we're limiting the increase to the \$15-\$18 range—less than half of inflation. No other Park owner in San Marcos would do that.

If it's any comfort, rents at Palomar West are \$100 higher than at East. Don't tell them I told you, though.

#### In Happier News

- More than 100 of our San Marcos residents had their tax returns prepared for FREE by volunteers from AARP. Just our way of making tax season less stressful. Thanks to Stacee & SPARC, our resident services partner, for sponsoring.
  - Next up for SPARC: another Fruit Picking Event (sometime in April) and a Senior Resource Fair in honor of St. George's Day (April 23<sup>rd</sup>).
- There was an accident in the Park a couple months ago as two cars collided. I guess those drivers forgot their New Year's Resolution to drive more cautiously inside the Park.
  - As they used to say on that old TV show Hill Street Blues, "Be careful out there!"

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


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


With all these things to do and participate in, come one and all and join in the FUN while making new friends and meeting our new neighbors.

#### Tech Is Helping Us Age at Home Comfortably

### Answer to April's Trivia Question: Where did April Fool's Day come from?

- ♦ Some historians speculate that April Fools' Day dates back to 1582, when France switched from the Julian calendar to the Gregorian calendar, as agreed to by the earlier Council of Trent in 1563.
  - $\Rightarrow$  As you know, the Gregorian calendar begins the new year with January 1 $^{\rm st}$ .
  - $\Rightarrow$  In the old Julian Calendar, the new year began with the Spring Equinox around April 1<sup>st</sup>.
- ◆ People who were slow to get the news or failed to recognize that the start of the new year had moved to Jan. 1<sup>st</sup>, and continued to celebrate it during the last week of March—April 1<sup>st</sup>, became the butt of jokes and hoaxes and were called "April fools."

#### **PERT—Palomar Estates East Emergency Preparedness**



Palomar Estates East has a fantastic emergency system in place in the case of unexpected events, but we **currently** have a small **problem**—The **system only works** when we have enough **volunteers** from our village to support that system. **AND WE DO NOT!** 

#### We NEED more BLOCK CAPTAINS yesterday!

The BLOCK CAPTAIN is the primary emergency response field person with direct contact and knowledge of the residents within his or her assigned block (8 to 12 houses).

#### Here's how it works:


- 1. We assign you to a block of houses in your neck of the village and equip you with some basic tools.
- 2. Once per year, you update a brief form on the mobility and health status of the residents in your assigned block.
- **3.** If, during the year, you learn of a change in your assigned residents' health and/or mobility, you report that too!


How simple can you get! You receive free tools and training as well!
