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Millenium Memo for May



Back in October, I reported on the booming Palomar East real estate market. 36 homes had sold in the 12 months ended Aug. 15, 2021, at an average price of \$201,828. Given all that activity, I offered some tips on how to expedite your sale escrow.

The market has to have cooled off since then, wouldn't you guess? Well, actually it's exploded. In the six months since my report, there have been 16 Palomar East home sales, at an average price of...wait for it...\$275,125!

Prices ranged from a low of \$180K to a high of \$420K. Five of the 16 sales were for more than \$300K. This doesn't exactly help Palomar's affordability numbers, but that's a discussion for another day.

I realize I just wrote about this a few months ago, but I figured you wouldn't mind hearing again how valuable your home is. It's good to be a Palomar East resident, isn't it?

In Other News

◆ Palomar East's ground rent adjusts every five years based on the inflation rate. We just got our 5-year Notice for the period starting this past March 1st. The amount of the increase: \$4,061/month, or \$48,732/year. That works out to about \$10.92/month per space in higher costs for the Park—just for the ground rent. Does that put your \$15/month increase in perspective?

- ◆ This month's Resident Kudo goes to Patty Gonzales, "for her help in designing the 2022 Directory Cover and donating her resources." Thanks, Patty!
- Recent expenditures: new Pool Heater, replacing the one bought in 2014 (\$5K) and repairs to the wood in the Card Room (\$3K for supplies, etc.). We also fixed the Men's Sauna, trimmed & added sprinklers to the exterior landscaping and made assorted other upgrades.
- Are the weeds in your yard getting a bit out of hand? Not surprising. As the old saying goes, "give weeds an inch and they'll take a yard."

We'd rather not get phone calls from your neighbors complaining about your yard, so please keep your weeds under control. If you think you don't like gardening, try planting a few seeds. It might grow on you.



In the Community Garden

My gardening really starts in February after a two-month break. Here's a little information of what I've done this year and what I'm planning on doing soon.

February ✓

Pulled weeds. Cleaned up excess garden clutter/stakes, empty pots, chicken wire, old bean trellis and other structures.



March ✓

Pulled more weeds. Amended soil. Planned beds to plant.

- ♦ Three rows of corn in long above ground bed with one row of crook neck squash on the sunny side.
- Planted some Swiss chard and Walla Walla onions in stack containers under the giant artichoke.
- Was given some sunflower seeds from Teri, #191 (thank you). Planted these in a new bed at the back of the garden, below the ice plant bank. Should see plants in a couple of weeks.
- ◆ To protect newly planted seeds from crows I have covered the beds. These birds will watch you plant the seeds and as soon as you have left the garden, will swing on in and raid the new beds.
- ♦ Hope to plant **green beans** (both varieties) **bush** and **pole** in the next few weeks.



April...Still in progress



Time to plant **squash**—at least two varieties: crook neck (near corn) and a vining heirloom zucchini. This one is my favorite summer squash. It stays firm

and has a mild, nutty flavor. Also yummy on your squash plants is the male flower, sauteed, stuffed, or just raw added to salads or pizza.

Also planting three rows of **corn**—peaches and cream and sweet white are my favorites—approximately 20 plants by seed. Will also purchase some already started plants. I like the instant gratification of seeing things growing. Corn should be ready to harvest by the 4th of July.

I mentioned **crows**. Believe it ir not, they are s funny to listen to (when they aren't dancing across the top of your coach). The range of sounds they make is great.

Also make sure your garden is **rabbit** proof. They can turn to liquid and get through any

into my garden last year. The rascally thing ate all my newly sprouted green beans.

We are also subject to a **gopher** population here. I had a beautiful pumpkin plant several years ago. I had watered it and about 20 minutes later I noticed it was all wilted. As I investigated, I saw that the gopher was eating its roots and attempting to pull the plant down in the hole.

Over the years, I have trapped a few gophers, but I try to leave this to our Park Maintenance crew.
