Justice Breyer, brings up an important point: specifically, what can we do to help maintain and improve our nation's system of self-governance?

Seven Elements of a Successful Democracy

A series of newsletter articles from beyondintractability.org provides a description of seven (7) elements needed to maintain a successful democracy.

These 7 elements are not only important with regard to our nation, but they are equally relevant to every organization in which members are elected to serve. This includes our organizations here at Palomar Estates East.

In times of organizational turbulence (see PEERA, pages 5-6), reflecting on these 7 elements may help point toward changes that would benefit all.

1. The Ability to Limit Destructive Escalation

Democracies must provide citizens with ways to address grievances and resolve disputes that do not escalate conflicts to destructive levels where significant debate is replaced with mutual hatred and a desire to hurt one another. They must also provide mechanisms to deescalate conflicts when they do become overheated.

Right now, in the United States, people on both sides of the Red-Blue (conservative-liberal) divide seem to believe that the only way they can protect their vital interests is by winning the next election. And the way to do that, many people believe, is to drive distrust and hatred of the other side higher and higher. Between traditional

and social media, both sides are stoking anger, fear, and hatred, and disseminating false stories, in order to get people to believe their side's view of "the truth." If left on its own, this results in a downward spiral of offensive activities, even eventually including violence. This is not an environment in which democracy can flourish. It might not even survive.

Healthy democracies are ones in which our leaders model and encourage respect for the other side by utilizing de-escalating strategies which are commonly used by the conflict resolution field.

2. A Communication Process That Promotes Mutual Understanding

Democracies must promote respectful and truthful communication, while condemning and, when possible, isolating disrespectful and false communication. (We do not call for blocking such communication, however, as we strongly support freedom of speech. Without such freedom, it becomes impossible to challenge ill-advised policies and actions.) However, social norms should strongly discourage the kind of misleading and hateful political communication that is now so widespread.

Rather than asserting that one side is right, and the other wrong, or one side is good and the other evil, we must practice and promote thoughtful speech and careful, respectful, active listening. This means we need to make the effort to genuinely understand what others believe and feel and why. That should then give us all a much better understanding about areas of common ground, the nature of remaining disagreements and how to move forward constructively on both.

3. Reliable Analyses of Problems and Potential Solutions Based on Verified Facts

Successful democracies must be able to reliably identify the problems they face, based on an understanding of verified facts, not the self-serving analyses and manufactured truths that are being promoted by both sides. (The Left tends to think this

- New faucets and handles were installed in both the clubhouse showers.

I hope everyone has a Happy 4thof July! Remember that the office will be closed.



Dear Palomar Estates East Residents.

Summer is now officially upon us! We invite and welcome everyone to the fantastic Fourth of July Celebration at the Clubhouse starting at 3:30 p.m.

For the PEERA Board, the month of June was a month of progress toward change, as well as a continuation of stressful conflict. During May and June, PEERA Board members were focused on updates and revisions to the 2016 PEERA Bylaws. Thank you to all Board members for their time spent collaborating and meeting for reviews and input. On June 10th, copies of the proposed Bylaws were distributed to all current PEERA members for review. And on June 21st, a meeting was held at the clubhouse for resident questions and comments regarding the proposed new PEERA Bylaws.

PEERA has faced opposition regarding various issues over the past. This is not new. There are always differences of opinion and interpretation in any governing body. We see this at all levels of government: City, County, State and Federal. What is new is that, beginning in February, there has been a rising level of opposition from a small group of residents regarding park amenities and even the governance of PEERA. Although this opposition had no basis in fact, it still required considerable time to address and respond.

In March, the PEERA Chair resigned for personal reasons. In accord with the PEERA Bylaws, the Vice-Chair then moved into the Chair position. This required other position reassignments. In addition, some positions had more than one committee assignment, thus reducing the overall number of Board members.

During this reorganization period resulting from the Chair resignation, the Board received multiple complaint letters, none of which had merit. More Board time was beginning to be spent addressing these baseless complaints than doing the business of PEERA. Eventually this Board had enough of this campaign of opposition.

In the Open Board meeting held on June 3rd, six (6) of the nine (9) PEERA Board Members resigned, with a July 5th departure date. Three PEERA Board Members remain. The letter of resignation read to those attending the Board Meeting is presented again below.

June 3, 2025

The PEERA Board is a group of resident volunteers whose sole objective has been to help make our community a better place for all and acting as a

liaison for Haven Management Services & Millennium Housing. We all joined the board for this purpose - to do what we could to help our neighbors with integrity and respect for all residents.

However, since the current board took office, and even prior to that, we have all been subjected to a sustained, intense harassment campaign by a small, but very vocal, group of residents. We have been deluged with false accusations and meritless complaints, all with the sole intention of forcing us to do exactly what they wanted, even when what they wanted was outside the authority of PEERA

We have been repeatedly threatened with lawsuits and other legal action - both as a board and individually. Again, all without merit.

The result has been that we are spending so much time discussing and responding to the claims and demands that we have not been able to devote the time necessary to actually do the work of the Board. Work related to beautification, website improvement, revision of the bylaws, and much more has suffered because of the near constant harassment. Additionally, all this has taken a serious toll on the physical and emotional health of all of us.

Therefore, it is with deep regret that we, the undersigned, are resigning from the board effective July 5th. We are not taking this action because of any demand from the group aligned against us, but simply for our own health and recognizing that it is impossible for us to be effective under these conditions.

We are giving the community this roughly 30-day notice to allow for us to transition our responsibilities and ensure required activities, especially regarding finances, do not get missed. However, during this time we will not engage in any new business, nor continue work on items that do not require immediate attention.

As a point of information, the current PEERA bylaws only allow for the Vice Chair to assume the position of Chair when it becomes vacant. There is no provision to allow for any other board member to assume Chair. Also, the bylaws only allow for the Chair to nominate replacements for vacant positions. Therefore, the only way to fill these vacancies will be at the upcoming election which the remaining Board members will oversee.

We look forward to continuing to serve the community however we can as fellow residents.

Thank you to all of you who have provided support and encouragement to this Board.

The 2025 PEERA Board believes it is best to move forward with a 2026 election by the entire community. No appointments will be made to fill any of the open positions. During the weeks ahead, departing and remaining Board Members will be available to discuss the volatile situation with possible candidates for the November election. The three remaining Board members will finish any in progress programs with committees as may be necessary.

We thank all of those who have supported PEERA Volunteers over the years and sincerely wish the best to those who follow.

The Power of Knowing Your Neighbors

A majority of Americans don't know most of their neighbors — and they barely talk to the ones they do know.

Why it Matters: Strong neighborhoods boost the health, happiness, and longevity of their residents. But over the last several decades, our connections with our neighbors have been fraying.

We're leaving our homes with our screens in our hands. The pandemic made us even less likely than we were before to stop and chat with new folks. As a result, most of the people living around us are strangers.

 57% of Americans say they know only some or none of their neighbors, according to a Pew Research Center survey. That share climbs up to 72% among 30- to 49-year-olds and 78% among 18- to 29-year-olds.

 58% say they know their neighbors but don't spend time chatting or hanging out with them.

The benefits of knowing thy neighbor abound.

- Lives saved: In well-connected neighborhoods, fewer lives are lost in tragedies, including <u>natural</u> <u>disasters</u> and <u>mass shootings</u>.
- Happier aging: Older adults who know their neighbors <u>report</u> a far higher sense of psychological wellbeing.
- 3. **Safer streets:** Tight-knit neighborhoods have <u>lower rates of gun violence</u>.
- 4. **Boosted wellbeing:** People who know their neighbors are generally cheerier, healthier, and spend more time outside.

Even in the age of dating apps, texting, and social media, most people get to know their neighbors in person.



is only a problem of the right, but it is not. The Left does it too, but they do it differently.

Problems cannot be solved without an accurate understanding of what the problem is and what is causing it. Hyper-polarization causes people to oversimplify their understanding of problems by simply blaming the other side, without considering the way in which they may be contributing to the problem or the role of factors that are beyond anyone's ability to control. This, then, leads people to have ideas for solutions that are very unlikely to work.

In order to be able to solve our mutual problems effectively, the "experts" that society employs to investigate issues must conduct themselves in ways that are genuinely worthy of the public's trust. In other words, the experts must be open about their methods, share and be willing to explain their data, findings, and conclusions both to other experts, and to the extent possible, to the general public.

If the public doesn't understand or trust the science, they are very unlikely to follow its guidelines. So scientists need to be able to explain their work in accessible language without jargon, and without talking down to lay listeners or readers. And, they need to focus on answering questions that make a difference in people's lives.

4. Fair and Equitable Power Sharing

Public trust in and willingness to support democracy ultimately depends upon the belief that the government will be responsive to and responsible for protecting the rights and interests of all citizens, not just the powerful, or the people in their own political party.

Ironically, now, both sides of the political divide seem to feel as if the government is not treating them fairly. On the left, there are a wide range of "marginalized" groups that feel as if they have been unfairly treated as long as they have lived in the United States. On the right, there are many who are struggling, but are not "marginalized" according to the left. Nevertheless, they feel that they are being unfairly treated now.

The only way democracy is going to be seen as legitimate and be supported is if all sides feel as if the government treats them fairly. This means they must have faith in electoral processes and outcomes, and they must feel as if the people in power do speak for and act for them.

Without the perception of fairness, our society will continue to careen from one set of policies to the polar opposite every 2, 4, or 8 years. It is also leaves everyone feeling extremely insecure, since one of the things that majorities typically try to do is to solidify their electoral position and make it harder for the other side win in the future. For democracy to work, people need to feel okay with losing an election, knowing that their vital interests will still be protected and they'll have a reasonable chance of winning the next time around.

Few in the U.S. currently feel that way, which is one reason why there is widespread consensus that U.S. democracy is badly broken. It won't be fixed until we start electing people who are willing to use fundamental conflict resolution approaches: listening to all sides to understand all parties' interests and needs, doing some form of joint fact-finding to determine what, actually, our problems are, and

then negotiating and compromising to make decisions that benefit the vast majority of the population, not just their "chosen" groups. This is the way "power-with" governance works, and this is what is needed if democracy is going to earn the public support it needs to succeed.

5. Underlying Common Vision

When former South African Ambassador to the United States, Ebrahim Rassool was asked what lessons the United States could learn from South Africa's reconciliation process, he said that "we

must begin from the end." By that he meant that we need to develop a society-wide image of the nature of the country we want to live in.

Now in the United States, the Left and Right appear to have very different images. These dueling visions set the stage for a continuing struggle over which image is going to be pursued. Together with our current power balance, that just swings the pendulum back and forth every few years.

A much better approach would be to encourage people to focus more on the underlying interests that we all have in common. (There actually are many, as we all want peace, health, respect, security, and prosperity for ourselves and our families). We then need to build a collective image of how we could work together to come as close as possible to attaining those goals for everyone.

6. Ability to Solve Problems

Successful democracies need to be able to integrate successes in each of the above areas into a trusted and broadly supported problem-solving system. Such a system would employ collaborative principles to give all stakeholders a role in jointly analyzing the nature of mutual problems, and developing, evaluating, selecting, and implementing options for addressing those problems while also fairly distributing benefits, costs, and risks.

Other types of less collaborative problem solving are also sometimes effective, such as expert problem solving. Still, the more the people affected by a decision are involved in making that decision, the more likely it will be accepted. Such collaborative problem solving is a very tall order if the earlier steps are not taken. However, it is a natural outgrowth of those steps once they are followed.

In today's hyper-polarized environment, however, this process has almost completely broken down, leaving us with little more than an all-out struggle for power between the two competing factions. The ethical and legal limits that normally constrain such struggles are also collapsing and now causing large numbers of people to question the legitimacy of the entire system.

7. Systems Thinking

Implicit in the discussion of the first six key elements of a successful democracy is a seventh and final element, the ability to think systemically and pursue all of these elements simultaneously.

This can only be done if people think about, strive to understand, and engage with the entire conflict system, instead of simplifying it into an "us-versus-them," "good-versus-evil" narrative.

It is essential that we listen to each other to understand what the different sides believe, and why they believe that. Is it because they have a misunderstanding of verifiable facts? Is it because their life background or current situation is different? Only when we understand the sources of different beliefs and opinions, can we solve problems in ways that are likely to be accepted by a majority of people and hence stand a chance (maybe even a good chance) of actually working.

Doing these seven things will be difficult, no doubt. But all are possible.
