
We have many volunteer opportunities at our Sorrento Valley headquarters. We also need volunteers at other locations in the community, as well as remotely.

Mission & Vision

Since 1993, the mission of School on Wheels has never wavered: To enhance educational opportunities for children who are experiencing homelessness from kindergarten through twelfth grade. Our goal is to shrink the gaps in their learning and provide them with the highest level of education possible. Our program serves as a consistent support system for our students during a time of great stress and fear.

The application process will include three steps: (1) Online Orientation; (2) Introductory Training Session; and (3) Background Check.



School on Wheels works with Operation Hope – North County (Vista).

Expectations:

- Tutor a minimum of 1 hour per week, typically between 3 pm to 7 pm
- Complete advanced training after 3 months of tutoring
- Demonstrate patience, persistence, and an innate love of learning
- Commit to 50 hours of volunteering

Millennium Memo

Despite Palomar's clear "No Soliciting" signs, apparently two men have been touring the Park trying to get folks to install Solar panels. Sept. 2022 Millennium Memo.

Apparently, that is still happening. As I said back in 2022, if you want solar and your home can accommodate the weight of the panels, more power to you. There is a problem that has arisen, however.

Often, the solar system is financed, with the payments secured by your home. Lately, however, we've noticed solar installers recording their contracts on the property, which not only violates your rental agreement, but might also affect the Park.

If you sign one of these agreements, make sure you only pledge your home, and not the entire Park. Otherwise, you may have to pay the legal fees to remove it from our title..

- Our last 3 holdouts finally came forward, and we now have 100% of Palomar East's Income Certs. Way to go, everyone. Kudos to you!
- Thanks also to those of you who made the corrections we requested during the homesite inspections. Sure, a few residents complained, apparently balking at the idea of having a tidy yard, but they weren't really serious, were they?
- A reminder: if your guest wants to use the Pool, hang around the Clubhouse or practice
 his/her Pickleball, you have to stay with them. Pretty boring, I know, but that's the Rule.
 If your friend wants to stay in the Park long-term, the next item might be of interest.

About Your New Roommate

You're allowed to have a co-occupant, but that person needs to be registered with the Office if he/she is going to stay with you for more than 20 days. You can understand why we would want to know who's living in the Park, can't you?

Being a registered co-occupant gives your roomie limited rights, including the ability to stay in your home long-term, but you'll still have to tag along if said roommate wants to use the facilities—unless, of course, that person is on title to the home.

I had a roommate many years ago who claimed I was not respecting his privacy—or at least that's what his diary said.

Thanks again for returning your Income Certs, make sure your roommate is registered...and have a fun Labor Day.

Maintenance Update

The palm stalks along the main street of the park were trimmed and cleaned. The streetlights went out on Ash St and the electrical line was repaired. Sections of the pool deck have been repaired with caulking. The concrete in the car wash was cleaned and power washed.

The clubhouse flooring contractor had an unanticipated scheduling availability that required a prompt decision to take advantage of the early scheduling. This will provide the earliest completion and availability of the new flooring for the holiday season. Our thanks go out to you and the various activity groups for making alternative arrangements for the short term. I am confident that the new flooring will be worth it.

EDCO Charges

The EDCO has increased their service rate with the park. You will notice an increase of 51¢ on your monthly statement. This has been their only rate increase since 2022 when they began the Organics Program.

August & September Updates

We can all agree that the clubhouse serves as the central hub of our community, and it is very important to ensure it meets the needs of our residents. It's exciting to collaborate on these significant improvements to the clubhouse, which are underway to include new flooring, artwork, dining room tables and chairs, as well as renovating the cardroom/library. Project schedules and completion



dates will be determined and communicated by park management.

It is understood that these renovations may cause some inconvenience, but your patience is appreciated as the work continues in creating a beautiful and functional space for everyone to enjoy. It is important to take the time to carefully consider each room's function, the space's aesthetics, and the budget to ensure we get these projects right.

In other news, we are pleased to announce that the City of San Marcos has approved the "Emergency Preparedness Plan." This is a great accomplishment, and we are grateful for the efforts of those who assisted us on this important project. You can find the document as a PDF on the PEERA website at peerasm.org.

Next on our agenda are the proposed updates for the PEERA By-Laws and Standing Rules, last updated in 2016. The proposed updates will be distributed to residents with paid PEERA memberships. For your reference, the current 2016 documents are on the PEERA website at peerasm.org.

We encourage you to review the proposed changes and the explanation sheet supporting these updates. Our goal is to ensure that these documents serve the community and the continued success of the PEERA Board. A ballot will be attached for your vote. Details and instructions will be provided.

Once this process is completed, we will then assign the PEERA Board nomination committee to start the 2025 election protocol. We thank you in advance for all your support.

Service Reference Guide

When the need arises to hire someone to make repairs to our automobiles or homes, it can be a stressful situation, often arising unexpectedly or in an emergency. In such circumstances, we typically seek recommendations from family, friends, neighbors, or colleagues.

To facilitate this process, we propose a proactive approach by reaching out to the community to identify companies or independent contractors who have earned your trust and are worthy of referrals. The services we seek to cover include HVAC, roofing, plumbing, electrical, gardening, cleaning, windows, appliances, remodeling, auto repair, and more.

With your input, we will compile a service reference guide, providing copies on both the residents' and PEERA bulletin boards in the clubhouse. If you are a service provider here in the park, we are happy to add you to the list.

Please start a list of your referrals and drop them in the PEERA Board lockbox in the hallway leading to the cardroom/library in the clubhouse once it is reopened and we'll get started.

The next General PEERA Board meeting is Tuesday, September 3th, at 5:30 p.m. in the clubhouse. If Clubhouse flooring is not completed, the Board meeting will be held on September 10th, at 5:30 p.m.

Moving and Grooving

Another home leaves our park to make way for a brand-new home and new neighbors, too! Our park continues to have that extraordinary appeal of a well-managed community, and it reflects in the prices of our recent home sales.

As a park resident, do you often get this question from outsiders: "What's the difference between manufactured homes and mobile homes?" The answer is simple.

Manufactured homes are often referred to as mobile homes—and indeed, the two are, in a sense, the same thing. Both types of properties are regulated by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The main difference between a manufactured home and a mobile home is the date it was built. Homes built in a factory before June 15, 1976, are considered mobile homes, while factory-constructed homes built after that date are called manufactured homes.

Manufactured homes are still "mobile" in that they have a trailer hitch and axles attached to a steel beam that runs their length (which allows them to be transported to the home site). They are considered a vehicle for tax and zoning purposes because, technically, they can be relocated.

Other than that, they often bear little resemblance to the rectangular, metallic, trailers-with-thewheels-off of old. As noted above, manufactured homes are solidly built, can be affixed to the land in fairly permanent ways, and often run as much as 2,000 plus square feet (what the industry calls double- or triple-wide).

Mobile homes, being older, are often less expensive to buy than contemporary manufactured homes. But we have some pretty nice remodeled older homes here in our park that have sold for new home prices. This one, from Space #31, is probably on its way to a beachy area in Mexico for a second life. Farewell...

Language and Laughter

One of my favorite books of humor is Anguished English, by Richard Lederer. For more than 25 years, Richard Lederer was a high school English teacher. During this time, he collected and filed away hundreds of humorous segments written by students. In his introduction, Lederer notes:

"I have pasted together the following "history" of the world from genuine student bloopers collected by teachers throughout the United States, from eighth grade through college level."

The remainder of this article includes selected excerpts from the book.

Park Speed Limit & Stop Signs

Our community is facing a growing safety concern due to drivers disregarding the 15 mph speed limit and posted stop signs. This poses a risk to residents' safety, especially considering the absence of sidewalks, which necessitates sharing the road with pedestrians. Our speed limit and posted signs apply to vehicles, golf carts, and even bicycles.

Similar to the general speed limits that apply residential areas and business district zones, the California Vehicle Code 21107.9 sets the speed limit within mobilehome parks and manufactured housing communities at 15 miles per hour. These limits are based on safety considerations and a history of various traffic incidents in those zones.

Pay particular attention to cars backing out of their carports. Even for cars that have backup cameras, there is often a blind spot until the car is partly out into the street. And for cars with no backup cameras, backing up is significantly more difficult to see approaching vehicles.

Thanks to all of you who take the time to slow down, stop at the designated stop signs, and have patience while driving in our community. By doing so, you are prioritizing the safety of our community residents and visitors.



The Women, by Kristin Hannah

Women can be heroes. When twenty-year-old nursing student Frances "Frankie" McGrath hears these words, it is a revelation.



Raised in the sun-drenched, idyllic world of Southern California and sheltered by her conservative parents, she has always prided herself on doing the right thing. But in 1965, the world is changing, and she suddenly dares to imagine a different future for herself. "I've been retired for a year. I do some work with the homeless, and I thought, 'I have more time on my hands, and I'm very able to help.' Then I saw Feeding San Diego in the San Diego Union-Tribune, an article about how volunteers were needed. And I thought, 'I can do that. I can help,'"

Stephanie explained. "I started with food sorting. Then the Marketplace came up on the volunteer opportunities page. I liked it so much, and they

asked me if I'd like to do it on a regular basis. I've been in the Marketplace every Tuesday ever since."

The Feeding San Diego Marketplace allows community members to shop for no-cost groceries. Volunteers and staff work together to offer a convenient and dignified shopping experience.

"I like my friends that I work with," Stephanie said when asked why she keeps returning. "I like all the people that come. There's seniors, there's young people, there's people who are new to this country. It's a good feeling to help out. It's not a lot, just a couple of bags of groceries, but they're so appreciative. And it helps them a lot. And it's always a surprise to see what we have. It's very well-rounded. People like the snacks and the bread. They go crazy for the bread."

Addressing Senior Hunger

For many seniors, limited incomes and rising inflation make shopping for food difficult.

According to Feeding America, 1 in 14 seniors were food insecure in 2021. That amounts to about 5.5 million seniors. For Stephanie, helping other seniors adds to her passion for volunteering.

"It's a really good feeling to know that we're here to help seniors, especially seniors who are on a

limited income," Stephanie added.
"You see how grateful they are and how much it helps them. It's just a good feeling. By working here, you see how much it helps and how people need to have the extra food and be able to shop here. I'm happy to do it, and I'm glad I found it."

We asked Stephanie what she would say to other seniors and retirees about volunteering. "If you have time on your hands and you want to give that to the community and feel good about getting out and meeting new people, volunteer," she said.


Stephanie's Story
