This is the time of year for reflecting on the year that has gone by (so quickly!) and looking forward with anticipation to new opportunities in the coming year.

"Ok, I need to buy a scanner, since that would result in much better digital images than simply taking pictures of them with my cell phone.

"But how would that work? Would I scan several photos at a time. If so, how will I separate them?"

Then I remember the many notebooks and boxes of photographs that need to be sorted...after which I decide it's time to water my plants. I'll think about the photos later.

Photos with No Names, No Dates, No Stories

Based on my history of inaction, I am resolved to make the following two New Year's Resolutions (and maybe encourage you as well):

<u>Resolution 1</u>: Make THIS the year to get my photos converted to electronic format so they could be viewed and stored on a computer.

(P.S., I have started on this. I selected a company called DigMyPics (digmypics.com), since they include enhancement of the images, even old photos, as part of the service.)

<u>Resolution 2</u>: Make an effort to record information about those photos (such as names, dates, and additional information or stories).

Memories are the connective tissue that bind generations of family together with a sense of identity. Photographs and videos become a large part of that structure.

I have a trunk full of family photographs that have been just sitting in the back of my closet for years. Some are in little albums with torn covers, others are in glass frames, cracked and dusty with age.

I thought I ought to pull out the photos to see what treasures I might uncover. Long before fancy cellphones were available, my great, great uncles and aunts captured moments at picnics, birthdays and holidays with Brownie and Kodak cameras. With my mom and dad passing in 1991, I am unable to identify even one of the faces. A few snapshots have notes scribbled on the back, but they mean little to me. I can tell Joe was a man who didn't like to shave, and little Jody could stand on her head. Jack wore suspenders and a grin. That's about it.

I do know there are great stories to be told from those old shots. I'm confident several of the babies held in the hands of mothers led interesting lives and had children of their own, who now may be in Maryland or Kansas or even miles down the road from me.

It's silly, but I can't throw a single photo away. In all those yellow faded faces, there must be a whole bunch of me.

I find this story disturbing, and also motivating. Memories of family and friends are so important. But even digital photographs and images can suffer the same fate as the images in this story if there are no names, dates, and descriptions.

For my mother's 80th birthday, we four kids assembled pictures of all the various homes we had lived in. Then, at her birthday dinner, we took turns talking about some of the things we had







done at that home (that she hadn't know about). We audiotaped the dinner conversation. It was a very fun evening for both the kids and my mom. Now that she is gone, it is even more precious to hear her laughter at that dinner.

 - Next up: an \$85K remodel of the Kitchen & Art Room, starting in January. Although some events will have to be placed on hold for a few weeks, you'll love the result. Thanks for your patience.
- Finally, we owe a big Kudo to Kasey & his team—including new Maintenance Manager, Bert Hamernick--for the job they do maintaining Palomar East's 54 lush acres, hillsides and facilities. Thanks to them, you live in a beautiful community.

Just another great year in Palomar!

You should have received the PEERA Board Packet. This provides details regarding the importance of PEERA membership, the membership dues envelope, and our famous Palomar Estates East Wish List.



Residents' Emergency Plan Update

Our goal these months since summer was to review the existing PERT program for Palomar Estates East and update the program, as needed.

Let us recap that journey.

· Connect with Existing Block Captains

Our first task was to review the existing Block Captains list. There were <u>33 Block Captain</u> positions, each with the responsibility of about 10 to 12 homes (on average).

In the review, we found that there were many people on the list who were no longer residents in the park, and others who were no longer able to serve as Block Captains.

After the review, it became clear that there were only about <u>23 Block Captain</u> volunteers compared to the <u>33 identified</u> by the existing PERT program.

Changing Nature of the Block Captains List and Availability During an Emergency

One realization as part of the review process was just how fluid the Block Captains List can be. Even after updating the list, there continued to be changes to the list. Thus, there was a need to review and update the Block Captains List on a fairly frequent basis.

In addition, the way the Emergency
Response System was structured, if a few
Block Captains happened to be gone or
unavailable during an emergency event,
there would be a need to either increase the
available Block Captains responsibilities, or
appoint temporary Block Captains, who may
not have had previous Block Captains
training.

The solution was to create a Resident's Emergency Plan that requires a smaller, but more flexible Response Team. A key focus of the plan is to provide residents information resources that will help them be better prepared for various types of emergencies.

The details of this approach are currently being drafted. The general structure of the Palomar Emergency Response Team (PERT) will incorporate both the Park Manager and PERT.

Park Manager

✓ Various responsibilities including gates, valves, and other park-related tasks.

PERT

In an emergency, all PERT members will report to the Main Clubhouse for assignments.

- Emergency Coordinator This team member will coordinate PERT tasks with the Park Manager, make assignments of Area Captains and Response Team Members, and facilitate communication via the Communication Team Members.
- Area Captains In an emergency, the Area Captains will be assigned areas of the park to monitor circumstances and conditions in that area and report back to the Emergency Coordinator.
- Response Team Members These team members will remain in the Main Clubhouse and be sent out to respond to needs, as identified by the Emergency Coordinator and Area Captains.
- Communication Team Members These team members will facilitate clear and responsive communication among groups.

Safety Updates for the New Year!

Happy New Year Palomar people! I hope you have enjoyed lovely and happy holidays this season.

I always look at my safety provisions in the fall season and this year was no different. I realized after the last article I wrote for *The Breeze*, that I didn't have fire extinguishers! Oh no!

Netflix Series "Virgin River" – And The Hunt For Fire Extinguishers

Then it really became urgent when I watched the latest season of *Virgin River* on Netflix (one of my favorite shows). Halfway through the season, a big fire breaks out and evacuations happen and, of course, many lives are saved! What I loved about the episodes, besides the heroics, was how the town came together to support each other. The very hands-on mayor, who is awesome, had created a plan. Everyone knew what to do and how to help each other the best they could during the crisis. Consider it a training video to remind you of what to think about if we are impacted by a big fire.

I went on the hunt to find a fire extinguisher and on Amazon I found some water-based fire extinguishers.



I chose these fire extinguishers for ease of use – they are not too heavy and work on any kind of fire. Plus, they are relatively inexpensive (\$23/2 pack). I bought a 4-pack and installed them around my house, including 2 in the kitchen.



There are many types of fire extinguishers available. This is not an endorsement of any product, but rather an encouragement for you to do your research and get appropriate fire extinguishers for your home.



Pack Your 'Go Bag'

Here is a list of items from Pelican.com and CNN.com to consider packing in your 'Go Bag' in case of evacuation:

- 1. Water: 1 gallon per person per day
- 2. <u>Food</u>: Lightweight, shelf-stable, such as freeze-dried fruits, energy bars, nuts, tuna pouches, and beef jerky
- 3. <u>Medication</u>: 3 days' or more medications and travel-sized pain relievers, antacids, etc.
- 4. <u>First-aid kit</u>: Bandages, gloves, a face mask, gauze, medical tape, antibacterial cream, a cold pack, and a thermometer
- 5. <u>Multi-tool</u>: Knife and basic tools, including screwdriver, pliers, wire cutters, and scissors
- 6. <u>Light source</u>: LED flashlight or a headlamp
- 7. Cash: Cash in small bills and coins
- 8. <u>Important documents</u>: Documents such as passport, driver's license, insurance policies, medical records, etc.
- 9. <u>Sanitation supplies</u>: Toilet paper, wet wipes, and hand sanitizers
- Clothing: Change of clothes, including a warm layer and sturdy shoes
- 11. <u>Personal hygiene items</u>: Toothbrush, toothpaste, soap, and deodorant
- 12. Pet supplies: Food, water, medications, etc.
